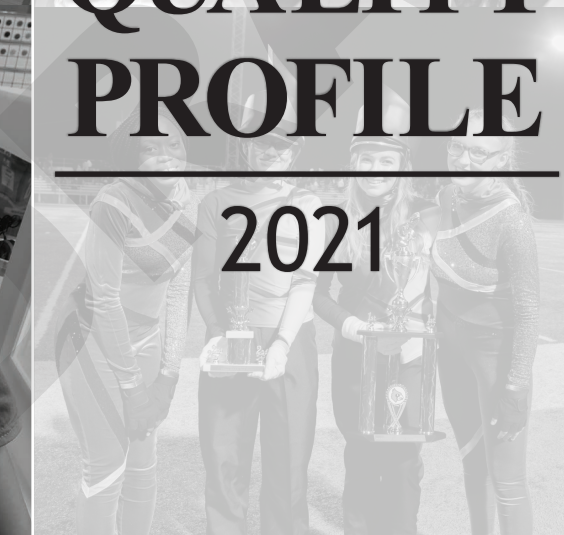

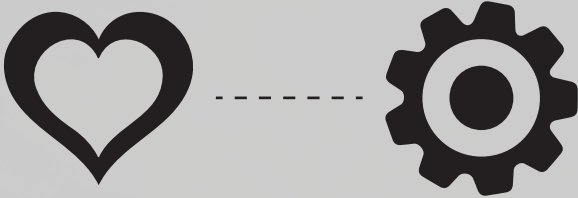

HOW WE CLIMB HIGHER

One key to continued academic improvement in Oak Hills Local Schools is the use of District Math, Literacy, and Special Education Leadership Teams. These teams of teachers and administrators meet monthly to analyze data, research instructional methods, present professional learning opportunities, model lessons in classrooms, identify staff needs, and facilitate communication around instructional topics. It’s a cost-conscious, shared-leadership model that uses the district’s greatest asset – its teachers – to improve instruction.

Breaking Down Barriers

Oak Hills High School awarded the College Board’s AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award for closing the gender gap.

Help for Mom and Dad

In 2020-21, OHHS students earned 1,013 credits in College Credit Plus courses – potentially saving parents a whopping \$279,000 in tuition costs.

Meeting the Needs of the Whole Child

- Oak Hills Local Schools’ 10-year partnership with Cincinnati Children’s Hospital Medical Center provides on-site mental health services with licensed therapists at all nine schools, at no cost to the district. This partnership has served as a model for schools across Southwestern Ohio.
- In 2022-21, the OHLS/CCHMC partnership provided 6,839 hours of mental-health treatment services to 468 students. To meet an increase in mental-health needs, CCHMC increased staffing to 13 full-time, school-based therapists and a nurse-practitioner.
- Oak Hills Local Schools was pleased to partner with CCHMC to obtain funding through Governor DeWine’s K-12 Prevention Education Initiative Grant, which expands mental wellness services to students, families, and staff. These funds, along with our continued partnership with CCHMC, allowed us to bring the highly regarded Adapt for Life program to our K-12 students, to build skills to deal with stressors and lead healthier lives.
- OHLS is in its third year of using the Panorama screening assessment in grades 3-12 to gain insight into students’ school experiences and mindset toward learning, and to improve how the district meets their social and emotional needs.
- Oak Hills Local Schools was awarded an Ohio School Safety Training Grant of \$38,390 to promote school safety and positive behavior.
- Grant activities have focused on crisis-prevention training and resources to support student mental wellness and positive behavior.
